MotorsportRoad CourseRepeat Win at Sahlen's Six Hours at the Glen

After rain washed out the qualifying laps on Saturday, fans were not too sure if Mother Nature would cooperate on Sunday either. The race started at 10am with the temperatures in the mid-60s which made for good lap times. The starting lineup was determined by the team's championship points seeing how there were no qualifying laps.

By 2:30 pm there was continuous rain all around the area. Most cars changed to their wet tires. Out came the fifth yellow flag of the race because of weather and track conditions. At 2:41 the red flag came out as the clock continued to count down. The trucks came out to broom water off the track and at 2:55 the engines are restarted and the race resumed.

Fifteen minutes later we have another yellow flag caused by Oliver Gavin in his #4 Corvette which spun into the tires on turn one. Just 10 minutes after that, once the green flag was raised Ricky Taylor wrecked his car.

It was a disappointing day for Ricky Taylor and his #10 Corvette. After leading the majority of the laps (55), Taylor hit the outer barrier by turn 10 with 50 minutes left in the race. He spun across the track causing the #01 car of Joey Hand to spin also. Hand's car continued on but Taylor limped into the pits without the front bodywork of his car. Taylor had to quit with 39 minutes left of the race.

The race ended under caution with cars sliding off the track due to the rain.

Richard Westbrook and Michael Valiante, who won last year's six hour race at The Glen, ended up in the winner's circle again this year with their #90 VisitFlorida.com Corvette. They led just 18 of the 160 laps including the final 3 behind the pace car. They are the first drivers in the series to win twice this year.

Second place went to Scott Pruett and Joey Hand. Their #01 Ford was leading late in the race but had to pit for fuel with 10 minutes left in the race giving Westbrook the lead.

Barbosa/Fittipaldi/Papis with their #5 Corvette came in third.

The team of Sellers and Henzler barely won the GT Le Mans class with their Porsche 911 after taking a big chance and not stopping to refuel.

Van der Zandel, Hedlund and Popow won the Prototype Challenge division. It was the team's second win this series.

Carter, Lawrence and Goossens won the GT Daytona class in their #93 Dodge Viper.
